

William Law CE Primary School Pupil Premium 2015/16

Pupil premium is government funding provided to schools to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and to close the gaps between them and their peers.

In 2015/16, William Law received £187,438 of Pupil Premium funding.

Summary of spending		
<p>The Pupil Premium funding received by the school was used to support pupils eligible for the Pupil Premium in the following ways:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Subsidising the cost of educational and residential visits. • Subsidising the cost of swimming lessons. • Music lessons- individual instrumental tuition for those showing musical aptitude. • Supporting the cost of school uniform. • Additional Teacher and Teaching Assistant support to allow children to make good progress and meet their targets. • 1-2-1 tuition for key pupils. • Learning Mentors and Family support. • Professional Development for teachers and support staff to provide the best teaching and learning for Pupils • Purchasing learning resources, including those for Big Maths, Success at Arithmetic, Reading for Pleasure and Talk for Maths. 		
Item	Cost	Impact
Subsidising cost of residential visits for Pupil Premium children.	£3440	All Pupil Premium children were able to go on the residential visits in Years 4 and 6. Contributing to half of the total cost of the residential supported this. 100% of the disadvantaged children in year 4 and 6 were able to attend the residential. This gave them vital life experiences and gave them an alternative enrichment, which allowed them to develop independence, collaboration and teamwork skills.
Educational visits paid for Pupil Premium children.	£1,764	All children able to attend educational visits. This informed the work that the children needed to complete as part of the curriculum leading to good progress by the end of the year across all year groups. The disadvantaged group made generally good progress across the school, in reading and maths by the end of 2016, but only made satisfactory progress in writing.
Music lessons	£3,139	Those showing interest and aptitude for music are able to have instrumental tuition. 24 children are

		now having music lessons, which was an increase from the previous year.
School Uniform	£3780	Children attend school with correct uniform, ready to learn. Children were ready to learn and had equality of opportunity therefore felt secure and the same as everyone else within school. This led children to feel like they were treated fairly in school and ranged from 83%-99% across Reception-Yr6. This further increased to an average of 97% in Key Stage 1 in the most recent survey April 2017.
Cost of swimming lessons for children in Years 5 and 6	£1244	All children in Years 4, 5 and 6 able to go swimming and achieve government target of swimming 25m by the end of KS2.
Teacher support to enable Pupil Premium children to make good progress and reach their targets.	£85,374	<p>Pupil Premium children make good progress and achieve their targets. This enabled first quality teaching for these children and for specific interventions to run. It also allowed SG and CF to work with specific teachers to improve teaching and learning. It also allowed Middle leaders to be released from the classroom to improve the quality of teaching and learning through monitoring and improvement planning.</p> <p>This led to 88% of lessons been good or better in the academic year 2015/16 with 17% been outstanding. In Reading and Maths by the end of Key Stage 2, in 2016, lower attaining pupil premium children did better than the national average. At key stage 1 in 2016, disadvantaged pupils who had a higher attaining starting point at the beginning of Key Stage 1 did well compared to the national average (children who were exceeding at EYFS).</p>
1-2-1 support	£2700	<p>Targeted intervention to enable children to meet targets. This was tracked and children who were not making good or better progress were targeted for different interventions.</p> <p>In Reading and Maths by the end of Key Stage 2 lower attaining pupil premium children did better than the national average.</p>
Teaching Assistants to provide targeted support.	£54,876	Provide intervention so that children meet targets both in the classroom and in specific interventions such as First Class Maths, Precision teaching and Project X. Progress was good or better across the school for all groups of learners, The disadvantaged group made generally good progress across the school, in reading and maths by the end of 2016, but only made satisfactory progress in writing. This could be due to the targeted interventions been reading and maths based.
Learning Mentors and Parent Support	£20,980	Support for families and children's emotional welfare. Enables teachers to focus on children and

		helps children to be ready to learn. This has helped the children to be ready and feel safe in school. This was confirmed in the 2015 pupil survey where across Rec-Year 6 90-99% of children say that they feel safe in school. In April 2017, this had increased to 96% in Key Stage 1 and 99% in Key Stage 2.
Learning Resources	£15,698	To support children's learning and meeting of targets. This has supported Assertive Mentoring in maths in Key Stage 2.
Professional Development	£10,500	Osiris Outstanding Teacher Intervention for 6 teachers. To skill up teachers to deliver excellent first quality teaching. This has led teaching and learning to be judged as 88% good or better and 17% been judged as outstanding.
